# 1,200 voters aged over 100 yrs in Gurugram, 13 above 120

District administration launches verification drive of voters

**GURUGRAM, JANUARY 31** Nearly 1,200 voters have been found aged over 100 years in the latest Gurugram electoral roll, prompting the district authorities to launch a verification drive.

Thirteen out of them are said to be aged 120 years, 1,134 voters were aged between 100 and 109 years and 57 between 110 and 119 years. The startling revelation was made in the voter list made public by the local administration recently.

Taking notice of the figures, the administration has ordered a review of these 1,200-odd voters.

homes for the physical verification. We are counter checking their identity proofs. We can say anything on this only when the review is complete,” Deputy Commissioner Nishant Yadav told *The Tribune*.

It may be noted that the

verified age of the oldest man ever was 116 years and 54 days, of Japan’s Jiroemon Kimura (1897–2013).

Gurugram has recently been judged as the best district for electoral practices.

At present, the total number of voters in the district is

1384,625, of which 729,168 are male voters and 655,457 are women voters. There are 24,637 voters aged 18 to 19 years, 244,832 aged 20 to 29 years and 330,960 aged 30 to 39 years.

The total number of voters in Pataudi assembly constituency is 245,787, of which 128,390 male voters 117,397 women voters.

Similarly, the number of voters in Badshahpur assembly constituency is 462,765 in which 244,499 are males and 218,266 females. Badshahpur is the largest assembly constituency of the district in terms of number of voters.

The total number of voters in Gurugram assembly constituency is 405,814, of which 212,363 are male voters and 193,451 female voters.

## Over 300 shanties razed after complaint of illegal sale of drugs

**GURUGRAM, JANUARY 31** A joint team of the Haryana Shahari Vikas Pradhikaran (HUDA) and Police Department demolished over 300 shanties established in a 4 acre land in Sector 56 here over a complaint regarding the sale of illegal drugs in the slums here. A senior police officer said the remaining shanties would also be removed on Wednesday.

During that time, two women were also arrested for drug peddling, who are now in jail.

After the police received a tip-off regarding the same, they finally decided to take action. A senior police officer said a police team, along with the anti-encroachment squad of HUDA, reached the slum around 2 pm and razed the shanties.

The residents were instructed to evacuate the shanties. Later, the authorities demolished over 50 per cent of the shanties.

## RWAs asked to finalise spots to feed stray dogs in G'gram

Such points should be away from playgrounds: Civic body

GURUGRAM, JANUARY 31

Amid complaints regarding the stray dog menace, the Municipal Corporation of Gurugram (MCG) has directed the resident welfare associations (RWAs) to finalise spots in 15 days where stray dogs can be fed.

The aim is to discourage the practice of residents feeding stray dogs randomly.

Several dog bite cases are surfacing in the region and the RWAs have been blaming the practice of random feeding of stray dogs. The civic body has also issued a helpline which can be reached through a toll free number — 18001801817 — or through WhatsApp on 7290075866.

Municipal Commissioner Narhari Singh Bangar said that under the Animal Birth Control Rules-2023, it is the responsibility of the RWAs and the apartment associations to make arrangements for feeding the animals, such as stray dogs.

He said that feeding places should be made with mutual consent based on the number of dogs and they should be away from children’s playing areas to avoid any untoward incident. He also said that RWA should come up with guidelines and make people aware about the same.



### PANEL TO SETTLE DISPUTES

- Panels to be formed to resolve disputes related to stray dogs and inspect sterilisation and vaccination of dogs
- The move is to discourage the practice of residents feeding stray dogs randomly amid complaints regarding animal attacks

“Experts and the local RWAs feel that it is random feeding across residential areas which draws dogs near children or senior citizens. We are not against stray animals. Citizen’s safety is our priority. People are free to feed dogs but only at designated places away from playgrounds. We will soon start penalising violators,” said MCG Commissioner Narhari Singh Bangar.

Apart from this, dog lovers who want to adopt street dogs should come forward. Bangar said that a committee would be constituted by the civic body to resolve the disputes or complaints related to stray dogs. Along with this, a sepa-

rate committee will also be formed to inspect the sterilisation and vaccination of dogs and the boarding centre. He said that two new centers would be started to speed up the vaccination work.

Meanwhile, an FIR has been registered against the Sector 23 RWA for the “murder” of a dog that reportedly bit an eight-year-old child, who is struggling for life. Filed by a local animal lover, the FIR mentioned that the animal fell prey to unjustified mob justice and was shot dead. A postmortem examination is being conducted on the body which activists claim looks like a jackal. — TNS

## Former MP Manvendra Singh shifted to G'gram hospital through green corridor

Former MP Manvendra Singh, who got injured in a road accident on the Delhi-Mumbai Expressway and was admitted to a private hospital in Alwar last evening, has been shifted to a private hospital in Gurugram for further treatment.

The former MP’s wife Chitra Singh lost her life in the accident while his son Hamir and driver Narendra, who got injured, have also been shifted to the hospital here.

The accident took place when Manvendra, son of former Union minister Jaswant Singh, and his family were on their way from Delhi to Jaipur. Chitra’s body was sent to Jodhpur last night.

### SUFFERS MULTIPLE FRACTURES, WIFE DEAD

- Manvendra Singh suffered multiple injuries in his ribs in a car accident that took place on the Delhi-Mumbai Expressway on Tuesday night
- His wife Chitra Singh lost her life, while their son Hamir suffered fracture on his hand and driver Narendra sustained minor injuries in the accident
- A CCTV camera captured the vehicle skidding off the road and hitting a cemented parapet on the vacant space between two elevated roads in Rajasthan

According to doctors, Manvendra suffered multiple fractures in ribs while his son suffered a hand fracture and the driver sustained minor injuries.

According to the Rajasthan Police, the driver apparently lost control of the car, which then collided with the wall of a flyover. A CCTV camera captured the vehicle skid-

ding off the road and hitting a cemented parapet on the vacant space between two elevated roads.

Manvendra, a former MP from Barmer, had quit the BJP and joined the Congress. He also contested the 2018 Assembly Elections against then CM and BJP leader Vasundhara Raje from Jhalrapatan constituency. He had lost the poll.

## Man booked for ‘killing’ wife in Gurugram

A 28-year-old woman died today after she was allegedly forced by her husband to sleep outside the house at night in the cold weather conditions in a Farrukhnagar village here. The victim was allegedly being harassed for dowry.

The deceased has been identified as Poonam, a native of Rewari, while her husband has been identified as Mangat Ram. In his complaint, Poonam’s brother Hemant Kumar said that Mangat used to thrash Poonam under the influence of alcohol.

An FIR on the charge of murder has been registered against Mangat at the Farrukhnagar police station. A senior police officer said they would take action as per the law after verifying the facts. — TNS

## 800 kg seized drugs destroyed in Faridabad

FARIDABAD, JANUARY 31

The police have destroyed around 800 kg drugs and narcotics material seized in 114 cases in the past few years.

Police spokesperson Sube Singh said the process was carried out under the supervision of the Commissioner of Police and chairman of the disposal committee, Rakesh Kumar Arya, on the premises of the Golden Eagle Waste Management Company here.

Among the drug smuggling cases, 90 cases were registered against those in possession of ganja while 23 cases were registered against those possessing smack, injections, heroin, methamphetamine drug, pills and capsules, etc.

The destroyed narcotics include 760.926 kg hemp, 37.388 kg stolen poppy, 79.204 gm smack, 265 narcotic injections and 368 capsules.

Sube Singh said the police have launched a helpline number, 9050891508, for public to provide information and inputs regarding drug peddling in the city and district. — TNS
